



Thank you for taking the time to read about our accomplishments in 2015. There is a lot of information within these pages and I'm excited to share all the hard work your Bonney Lake Police Department did for the citizens and community that makes up the City of Bonney Lake. 2015 marks my fourth year as the Chief of Bonney Lake Police Department and I have been honored to lead such an amazing group of dedicated, hard working staff members.

Highlights from our year include the 21st Annual Citizens Academy, National Night Out, and Bonney Lake Days. Our report will also contain information regarding what our Marine Services Unit, Metro SWAT, Crime Response Unit, Detectives Unit, Records staff, Bikes, Traffic Unit, Community Service Officers and what our Child Passenger Safety Manager did this past year.

We had another year without a drowning on Lake Tapps this past summer which makes it year number three! Our Marine Services Unit had a strong year after the lake was finally filled in early July to recreational levels. Metro SWAT HAD 22 missions, CSO's were busier than usual with transports, Property Room, Crime Analysis, Electric Home Monitoring programs, National Night Out and the Citizens Academy to name a few of the programs they were involved in. Our Traffic Unit was focused on impaired drivers and worked the school zones heavily in order to have our kids get to and from school in a safer environment. The Traffic Unit also participated in several fun runs throughout the year and will continue to provide the same quality of services in 2016. We utilized the metro Crime Response Unit during the bridge collapse which helped document the incident using the new FARO scanning system. FARO is a 3-D scanning system brought in by Lakewood Police Department. This system is quicker than traditional means using the total station.

In 2015 we brought on a part time Bailiff to handle court security while our Community Service Officers concentrate on transports and in-custodies during the court days. Our Bailiff, Chris Bassett also serves as our departments Chaplain. We also welcomed Justin Paulson as a Police Reserve Officer. Justin works full time in the computer world as an IT. Our retired Community Service Officer Steve Flaherty served one year as a Police Reserve Officer. We also welcomed Patricia Brooks, David Glabb, Thomas Atwell and Kym Glover as our newest volunteers.

I hope you enjoy reading this year's addition of Bonney Lake Police Department's Yearly Report. We are a group of dedicated men and women here to service the needs of the citizens of this city as well as our visitors. We are just one of the professional and dedicated departments that makes up the City of Bonney Lake and we embrace the motto: United in Service. We are here to serve our community and to make it an environment people want to come to and raise their families and shop. We are all here for you and we take that job very seriously.

Investigations Unit

The Investigations unit is staffed by a Detective Sergeant, and two general detectives. In addition, the Investigations Unit has a full-time narcotics detective assigned to the DEA task force and a full-time detective assigned to the P.A.T.R.O.L. Auto Theft Task Force. The Auto Theft TFO is a fully grant funded position the DEA TFO receives grant funding. The Investigation Unit were assigned 246 cases in 2015, most of which were felony crimes, of those 235 cases were cleared. The detectives prepared and executed more than 30 search and seizure warrants related to those investigations.

The Investigations Unit investigated many serious felony crimes that consisted of sexual crimes, crimes against children, fraud and felony assault/domestic violence. Some of the highlighted cases from late 2015 are as follows:

Detectives with the assistance of the Crime Response Unit (CRU), investigated an industrial accident that resulted in the deaths of three people.

Detectives conducted an Identity Theft investigation that turned in to a multi-jurisdictional investigation which ultimately resulted in charges against numerous suspects with a total loss of more than \$100,000, this case was continued from 2014 as additional suspects and victims were identified.

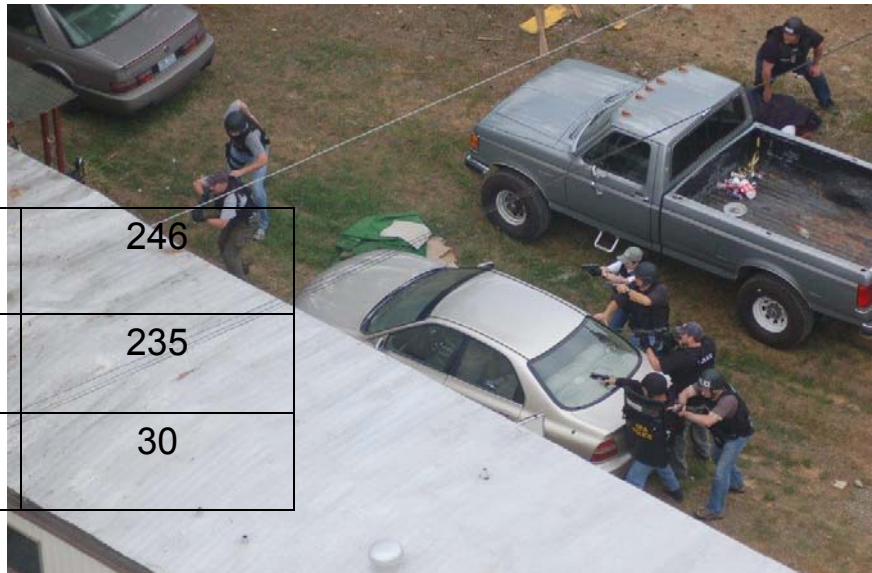
Detectives investigated two armed robberies at local businesses. The suspect was identified and later arrested and charged. He is awaiting trial.

Detectives investigated a shooting, where the homeowner was confronted by a known subject with a gun. The subject attempted to shoot the homeowner, and the homeowner returned fire injuring the subject. The man was arrested and is awaiting trial.

Our unit investigated multiple other cases which lead to felony convictions resulting in prison sentences and/or confinement in the Pierce County Jail.

We also assisted with several investigations as part of the Pierce County Metro Crime Response Unit including; A large scale shooting incident in Puyallup, multiple homicide investigations and several officer involved shootings.

Detectives participated in several specialized training classes including: Washington State Homicide Investigators Association annual conference, additional homicide training.

Auto Theft Task Force

ACTIVE TASK FORCE AGENCIES: Auburn, Bonney Lake, Federal Way, Tukwila, King County, and Renton

The Detective assigned to the P.A.T.R.O.L. Auto Theft Task Force was involved in many investigations of prolific auto and commercial vehicle thieves. In 2015, the Task Force conducted 126 investigations, resulting in 76 arrests and 189 charges. 177 Vehicles were recovered with a total value of over 2.5 million dollars. Our Task Force Detective was involved in the surveillance and arrest of a suspect wanted for several motor vehicle thefts, firing shots at officers, and vehicular homicide. He investigated a group of individuals trafficking stolen boats and motors from a local Native American Reservation. In November alone, our Detective was able to recover \$350,000 worth of stolen construction equipment, vehicles and trailers.

Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT)

Metro SWAT is a part-time, multi-agency tactical team which consists of officers from the Bonney Lake, DuPont, Fife, Lakewood, Milton, Orting, Puyallup, Steilacoom, and Sumner Police Departments. Metro SWAT is responsible for responding to high-risk incidents in the participating cities. In 2015, the Bonney Lake Police Department had two officers who were assigned to the Metro SWAT as an additional collateral duty. Metro SWAT successfully completed 22 missions in 2015, which was a decrease from 31 missions in 2014. In 2015, Metro SWAT was utilized for apprehending barricaded felony suspects, serving felony arrest warrants, search warrants for stolen firearms, and high risk search warrants. In addition to responding to high-risk situations, members of Metro SWAT provide training to local police agencies in the areas of firearms, patrol tactics, active-shooter response, high risk entries, and defensive tactics.

Traffic Unit

We did not meet our #1 goal of traffic safety in 2015 which is **zero** traffic related deaths. Unfortunately we lost three individuals in a tragic construction accident where the victim's vehicle was crushed by falling construction debris. Other than this tragedy we did not suffer any traffic collision deaths and only one serious injury collision in 2015.

Our **2015 Traffic Unit Priorities & Goals:** 1. **Zero** Traffic Related Deaths, 2. Collision Investigation, 3. DUI enforcement, 4. School Zone Enforcement, 5. Speed Enforcement, 6. Traffic Emphasis Patrols, 7. Commercial Vehicle Enforcement, Parking Enforcement

The traffic unit issued a total of 3,374 traffic infractions/citations in 2015. We focused heavily on school zone and DUI enforcement this past year. Officers issued 273 infractions/citations in school zones and processed 51 impaired drivers. As an entire department, Bonney Lake Officers issued 5,202 traffic infractions/citations. In addition to traffic enforcement, the traffic unit was involved in education events during the Bonney Lake Citizens Academy and assisted with traffic control for numerous community events during the year. Traffic units assisted with the 5K Sumner School District Fun Run, Bonney Lake Days, Labor of Love Triathlon, Halloween event in Sky Island and the 5K Tour-de-Lights Fun Run. The traffic unit investigated 249 reportable collisions in 2015. This was down from 250 collisions in 2014. This year we announced special traffic emphasis patrols each month designed to address specific traffic safety concerns. In 2015 we conducted the following special emphasis patrols:

Officer Sainati continued as our traffic motorcycle officer in 2015. Officer Sainati continued to ride his BMW motorcycle in nearly all weather conditions. In addition to traffic enforcement Officer Sainati employs the motorcycle in support of numerous community events. Officer Sainati participated in department open houses, Bonney Lake Days, National Night Out, Labor of Love Triathlon, Sumner School District 5K Fun-Run and numerous department functions. Officer Alfano and Sergeant Hoag both became Advanced Collision Investigators by attending training in 2015.

Metro Collision Response Team (MCRT)

The Metro Collision Response Team is a part-time, multi-agency collision investigation team that consists of traffic investigators from Lakewood, Puyallup, Bonney Lake, Sumner, Dupont, Milton, Fife and Buckley. MCRT is responsible for responding to and conducting investigations at serious injury and fatality collision scenes in the participating cities. MCRT responded to sixteen serious injury or fatality collisions in 2015. MCRT investigated collisions in the following jurisdictions during 2015:

MCRT participated in quarterly training in January, May and July. MCRT training consisted of car vs. pedestrian collision training, digital photography, determining drag factors and forensic mapping using the Total Station equipment. All of the MCRT collision investigators became familiar with the Total Station Equipment during these training classes and used the equipment to map a collision scene. MCRT Officers attended equipment demonstrations for new point cloud forensic mapping equipment that we hope to be available in the near future.



The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force. The task force is designed for law enforcement agencies in Pierce County to work as a cooperative group to concentrate DUI and traffic enforcement efforts throughout various locations in Pierce County. Each month, officers from these different agencies work DUI or speed emphasis in the local area of the host agency. The DUI Task Force was developed in 1983 when citizens were appointed by Tacoma and Pierce County elected officials to design and implement an education, public information, and enforcement program. Since that time, the program's scope and community involvement has continued to expand and has evolved into today's DUI Task Force.

Bonney Lake Traffic & Patrol Officers worked DUI emphasis patrols in Tacoma, University Place, Puyallup, Fife, Bonney Lake/Sumner/Buckley and areas of unincorporated Pierce County. Bonney Lake hosted the DUI Emphasis Patrol on January 24th, 2015. During this emphasis patrol 230 traffic stops were made, 105 NOI's and 11 citations were issued and most importantly 8 DUI arrests were made. The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Washington State Patrol's Target Zero Team. Target Zero is the state's strategic highway safety plan, and calls for reducing highway deaths to zero by the year 2030. The entire plan can be found at www.targetzero.com. Enforcement is one of four equal strategies of Target Zero, along with engineering, education and emergency medical service. Grants from the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission reimburse law enforcement agencies' salaries for their involvement in these programs. Sergeant Robert Hoag continued to represent Bonney Lake as a member of the Target Zero Team. Sergeant Hoag made DUI arrests in Tacoma, Puyallup, Bonney Lake, Sumner and Unincorporated Pierce County in 2015.

Party Intervention Patrol

Pierce County's Party Intervention Patrol (PIP) is a grant funded task force funded through Tacoma Pierce County DUI & Traffic Safety. Bonney Lake is just one of several East Pierce County law enforcement agencies that participate in the task force designed for law enforcement agencies in Pierce County to cooperatively reduce underage drinking through enforcement, intervention and education. Bonney Lake officers participated in five PIP emphasis patrols in 2015.

Property Room

The property room began the year with the annual appropriated property audit. There are 74 items appropriated to various officers or work spaces within the department. One (1) item was destroyed and/or depleted through department training with all other items accounted for.

We received and processed into our evidence room approximately 870 items for 2015. We processed 75 release requests for return of property to the applicable owners/victims.

The property room has continued to strive to maintain effective property room management by the disposing of evidence that is no longer required to be retained in the evidence room. Through case research, we were able to dispose and/ or destroy 632 items for 2015. We had a total of 90 items of illegal drugs, 517 items of property and no firearms that were destroyed.

There was a total of 12 items that went to Propertyroom.com for auction that generated an approximated total of \$78.27 in additional revenue for the department. We are making continued progress of transitioning over to the new bar code system.

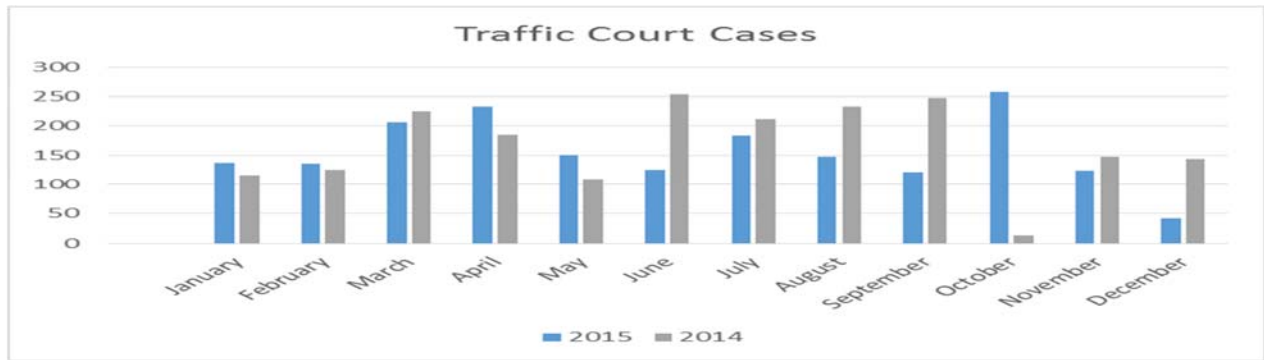
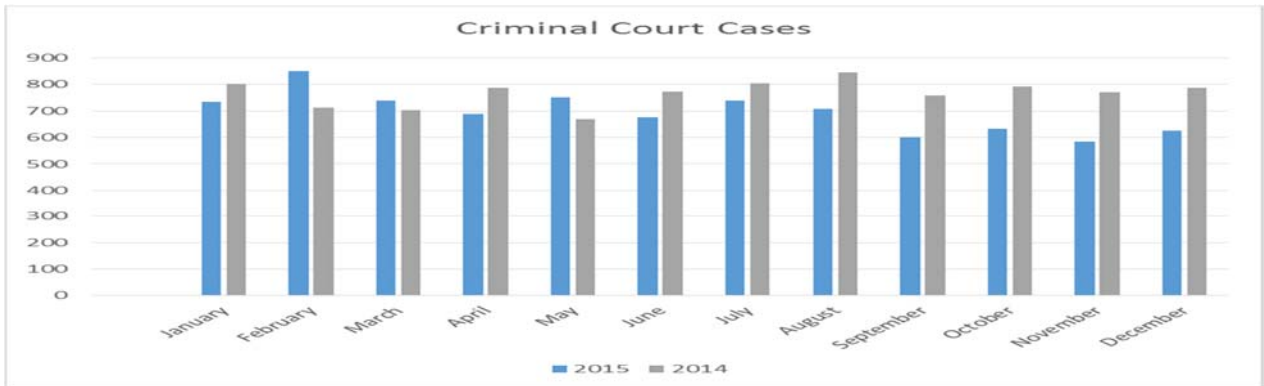

Community Service Officers of the Bonney Lake Police Department continued to provide excellent support working with our Patrol Officers, Sergeants and Command Staff in 2015. Community Service Officers (CSO's) also worked to promote Crime Prevention and Community Oriented Policing in both the residential and business community.

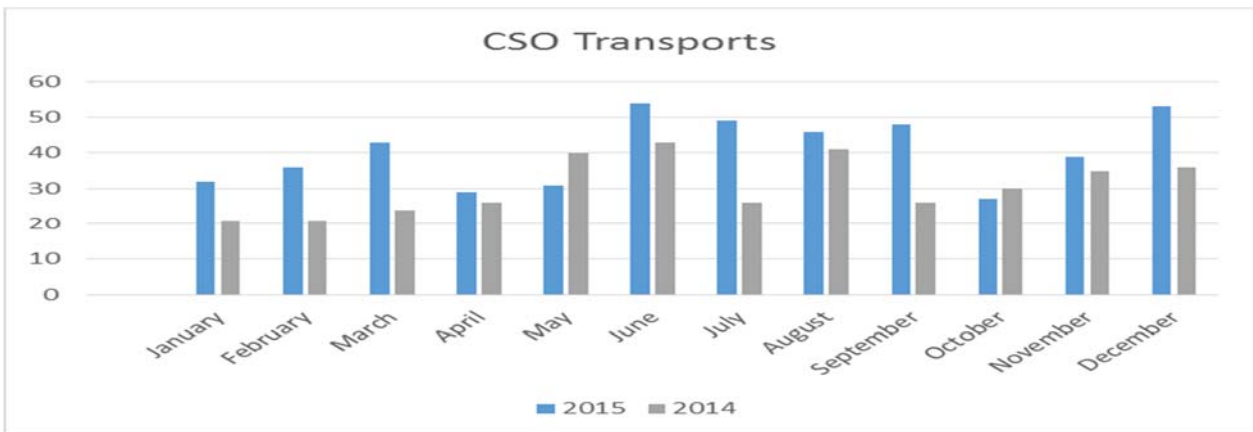
Although CSO's have a wide range of duties and responsibilities there are several which can be considered primary that included: prisoner transports, Bonney Lake Municipal Court security, property room management, electronic monitoring, and crime analysis. CSO Miller is also assigned to P.A.T.R.O.L. the Regional Auto Theft Task Force. In April our BLPD Chaplain, Chris Bassett was hired on as the Bonney Lake Municipal Court's Bailiff.



2015 was a busy year for court cases at the Bonney Lake Municipal Court. BLMC handles cases from the City of Bonney Lake, the town of Eatonville and the town of South Prairie. An average of 694 criminal cases were heard monthly with a grand total of 8,329 criminal cases heard this year. CSO's also provide court security during Traffic Court, which takes place 1-2 times per month. BLMC heard a grand total of 1,862 traffic cases this year.

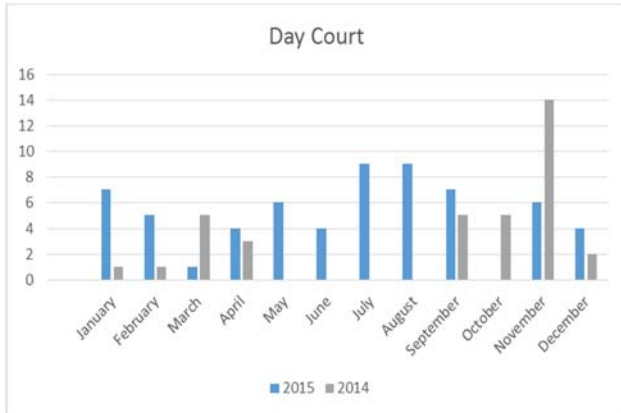


CSO's continue to transport inmates to and from jail. Felony prisoners are transported primarily to Pierce County Jail, while gross misdemeanor and misdemeanor prisoners are transported to Enumclaw, Puyallup, Fife or SCORE Jail, depending upon available jail space. CSO's transported a grand total of 487 prisoners this year, which is 118 more than in 2014.



Crime Prevention and Community Events Cont.

CSO's also supervise Day Court prisoners, which are offenders who have been convicted of Bonney Lake Municipal Court charges and are serving their time in court. Day Court allows prisoners a chance to serve their time in the courtroom instead of being incarcerated. CSO's supervised a total of 62 Day Court prisoners in 2015, saving the city \$3,720-\$8,900 in jail costs.



CSO Alvord oversees and supervises the Electronic Monitoring Program for the BLPD. The offenders participating in this program have been sentenced to electronic monitoring by BLMC instead of being incarcerated. Electronic Monitoring reduces jail cost and allows offenders to work while serving their sentences. BLPD supervises defendants that have been sentenced to Electronic Home Monitoring and Transdermal Alcohol Detection. 21 offenders were sentenced to Electronic Monitoring in 2015 with a total of 691 days of monitoring. 118 days were served by offenders participating in the Home Monitoring program and 573 days were served by offenders participating in the Transdermal Alcohol Detection program. This monitoring saved the City of Bonney Lake \$33,699-



CSO's are also in charge of radar trailer deployment and statistics. CSO Alvord deployed the radar trailer 20 times this year with a total of 103 days gathering statistics. The radar trailer provides valuable information allowing traffic officers to target specific areas in the city that require a speed emphasis.

Throughout 2015, CSO's participated in a variety of community and school events to include: Bonney Lake Days, National Night Out, Citizen's Academy, Open House, Scout Night and Shop with a Cop, to name a few. CSO's also attended three block watch meetings this year.

The Bonney Lake Marine Service Unity (MSU) continued its dedication to the lake community and guests by making safety and education its priority. With our goals in mind, the Marine Unit continued to be busy with water safety education, boater education courses, patrolling Lake Tapps, school education and joining forces with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and East Pierce Fire & Rescue all in an effort to keep our community safe. We believe our efforts have helped as we completed our third year with no drowning's on Lake Tapps.

The Marine Unit started the 2015 boating season by taking advantage of the extremely low water levels. Officers responded to and inspected every City owned buoy; replacing and removing buoys along with some damaged anchor cables. Officers removed seven abandoned 100lb anchors that had been found on the lake bed. The Marine Unit, in conjunction with the US Coast Guard Auxiliary, instructed four Boater Education courses for the citizens of Bonney Lake and its surrounding communities. The Marine Unit taught 17 Swimsafe assemblies at five school districts; Sumner, White River, Dieringer, Fife and Carbonado, educating approximately 8620 students. In late May, Lake Tapps was considered recreational level. The Marine Unit found and removed over ten large logs that were found floating on the water's surface.

Once the water was at recreational levels, MSU responded to a capsized boat with swimmers in the water. There were several buoy's that were placed at our GPS locations, Inspected 15 buoys and placed our new buoys. The unit had a couple of water safety interviews one included a piece being done by Pierce County TV. The unit participated in National Night Out as well as Bonney Lake Days manning the booth and educating people on water safety.

We had 252 patrol hours out on the waters of Lake Tapps in 2015 despite the water levels being too low for recreational levels until the July 4th holiday. There were 82 total written vessel inspection where 27 were passing and 55 failed. There were 109 total recreational boating warnings issued and 11 citations.

Allen Yorke Park was staffed by BLPD Officers on weekends and holidays, weather permitting. In addition to the weekend and holiday patrols, Officers worked several City sponsored events at the park, including several Tunes at Tapps, Friday Night Flix and Bonney Lake Days.

Activity at the park this year was dramatically lower from years past. This was in part due to low lake levels, which brought fewer people to the park. Officers patrol time was mostly limited to park events and regular patrol shifts were down this year due to few people at the park and/or weather.

Each Officer was required to fill out a statistic sheet for each shift worked. The statistics were compiled from these sheets and the results are listed below.

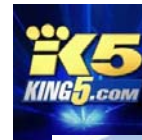

The Bonney Lake Reserve Police Officers, Ben O’Leary and Justin Paulson continue to be an asset to the department. Justin Paulson graduated the Reserve Academy in May and is working patrol under the supervision of a Field Training Officer (FTO). Both Officers participated in several city events. They helped provide extra security with a full-time officer at concerts, aided with Bonney Lake Days, handed out candy during the Sky Island Halloween event and continue their training in the field with their FTO. Officer O’Leary and Paulson combined volunteered hours equaled, 648 hours or approximately \$20,736 (not including benefits) for the year of 2015.

In October of 2015, Community Service Officer Nate Alvord completed his solo-probationary status and has been released from the FTO program after successfully completing all phases. CSO Kris Yanez acted as his FTO for the year and completed all monthly observation reports.

Bailiff Chris Bassett moved to the solo probationary status within the FTO program in July. CSO Yanez is his FTO and will complete monthly observation reports.

Training Unit

Training Unit held Simunition training in Sumner for all Bonney Lake Officers. Completed joint training with Puyallup PD. Officers participated in non-lethal training at the Reed property. Several on-line training posts were disseminated; fire extinguisher use, frost bit and medical aid. Officer Alfano attending a Taser course and became a certified Taser instructor. The training Unit added Det. Kocher, which should aid the unit with more hands on training. The Training Unit purchased two new Tasers after trading in two older ones. Trading in the older Tasers, effectively reduced the purchase price of the new Tasers by \$150.00 each.

Crime and Statistics

The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is an incident-based reporting system for crimes known to the police. For each crime incident coming to the attention of law enforcement, a variety of data are collected about the incident. These data include the nature and types of specific offenses in the incident, characteristics of the victim(s) and offender(s), types and value of property stolen and recovered, and characteristics of persons arrested in connection with a crime incident. The total number of NIBRS offenses reported to Bonney Lake Police Department in 2015 totaled 992. This is slightly down from the 2014 total of 1,099 resulting in a 9.7% decrease.

While overall NIBRS offenses were slightly down in 2015, an increase was seen for Forcible Sex Offenses (44.4%), Aggravated Assault (142.9%), Arson (100%), Fraud (20.5%), Drug /Narcotics Offenses (45.5%) and Weapon Law Violations (125%).

Several NIBRS offenses were down for 2015. These include Robbery (-28.6), Burglary (-17.6%), Simple Assault (-36.4%), Theft/Larceny (-8.2%), Motor Vehicle Theft (-37.5%), and Vandalism (-18.8%).

Correct use of child restraints offers the best protection for vehicle child occupants. Car seats reduce the risk of fatal injury by 71 percent for infants and by 54 percent for toddlers in cars. In addition, we know that rear-facing is five times safer than forward-facing and the back seat of an automobile is the safer place to ride for children.

In summary, Washington's Child Restraint Law RCW 46.61.687 require children to ride in an appropriate car or booster seat until at least age 8 or 4'9" tall; booster seats until adult seat belt fits properly; and up to age 13, children must ride in the back seat.

The goals of Washington's Child Passenger Safety Program:

1. Increase visibility of child passenger safety issues in Washington.
2. Maintain and support the statewide network of child passenger safety technicians and inspection stations.
3. Strengthen efforts to increase compliance, enforcement, and adjudication of the seat belt and child restraint laws.

Child Passenger Safety efforts focus on direct involvement by the Project Manager with the local CPS team leader network. This network of active safety advocates consists of 17 Target Zero Managers, 13 SafeKids Coalitions, and 2 local child passenger safety teams.

During the FFY 2015-2016 the following was offered there were 12 **Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) training courses** held throughout Washington in the following counties; Clallam, Clark, Grant, Lewis, Okanogan, Pierce (2), San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish, Spokane, and Walla Walla. The courses resulted in gaining 107 new car seat technicians.

Washington currently has 415 nationally certified car seat technicians; 21 of which are certified instructors and 9 are technician proxy. The focus continues to recruit and train dedicated individuals and partner with supportive agencies. It is imperative for each potential technician candidate understand the commitment and continuous learning needed to retain certification. The desire is to seek those who will more likely have a long term commitment to child passenger safety and not allow a lapse in their certification after two years.

Between October 1, 2015 and September 30, 2016, child passenger safety technicians representing the 32 active teams in Washington reached their communities in 4,512 different child passenger safety events. Through their efforts:

5,575	Car seats were inspected
2,678	Seats provided to families in need
99,227	People were reached with education
47,063	Pieces of educational material distributed

A grant process was made available to the local CPS team leaders to help address the uniqueness within their community. The following activities were supported by this grant process:

CPS technician support	\$50,089.38	Costs may include certification course, continuing education unit classes, instructors to conduct seat sign-offs, latch manuals, training seats and dolls.
Purchase of car/booster seats	\$32,638.77	For distribution by donation and targeting families with a demonstrated financial need.

Car seat inspection stations	\$2,725.49	Styrofoam noodles, clipboards, storage bin for supplies, locking clips, signage.

Law Enforcement Training: in March 2014 a concentrated effort began to train law enforcement on the particulars and enforcement of Washington's Child Restraint Law RCW 46.61.687. Starting testing an awareness curriculum generated strictly for police officers and presented in a classroom setting then made available online in May 2015. There have been 3,721 officers trained. It has also been made available on the CJTC's website as an enriched learning opportunity.

Car Seat Awareness Class: a Washington State approved curriculum has been generated and is intended for parents, caregivers, grandparents, public health, DSHS, foster parents, social work, CPS, daycare, preschool, teachers, medical professionals including pediatricians/nurses, WIC, and other child transporters. It must be presented by a nationally certified car seat technician who has completed the train-the-trainer workshop (which is now available online).

SeaMar: their maternity support services (MSS) received \$35,000 from a fundraising event; dedicated to the purchase and distribution of child restraints. The WA CPS program helped in providing training for staff and establishing a reliable distribution process. The program covered expenses for a CPST course, registration for 11 MSS SeaMar employees, and the license agreement to broadcast for their clients on their intranet.

Yakima County: partnered with Yakima Police to spread an awareness of child restraint use and state law. WA CPS program provided The Safest Ride campaign billboards and geo-fencing in English and Spanish in addition to A-boards placed at school drop-off zones. Focus was on nine elementary schools in the City of Yakima with 952 cars surveyed resulting in: 452 under 13 riding in the front seat, 163 incidents of misuse of child restraint or seat belt, 575 occupants NOT using a child restraint or seat belt, and 62 distracted drivers. Follow-up includes additional education, enforcement, and observational surveys.

Okanogan County: worked with the Native American Program Manager and Colville Tribe to hold a CPST course where five tribal members were trained as car seat technicians.

The Project Manager of Washington's Child Passenger Safety program participated in 125 activities; reached 160,344 through various media outlets; and distributed 1,621 pieces of material.

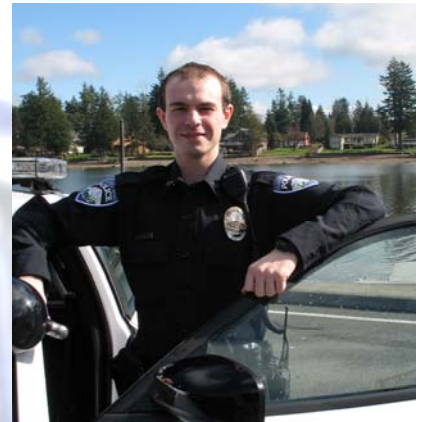
